The "sculptor" was a rebellious, dandy-minded p erson. He lived mentally at the periphery of s ociety, often making money easily. He underli ned his individuality by emphasizing the "ar chaic" elements in his dress, was anarchis tic-provocative, an a-social element in th e great social revolution, marked by an e gocentric drive for freedom, a "liberti ne" without education who found his i deal in sexual promiscuity, film, j azz a _nd jit t_ He had at least t always
